PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Fellow Members,

It seems only a very short time ago that you honored me by electing me your President. Tonight it is my responsibility and priviledge to deliver the Annual address.

Firstly I would like to record the great debt we owe our Secretary. The demands upon his time, energy and ability in the last year have been heavy, especially in his dual role of Secretary-Treasurer. I personally as President and you as Association members, have been most fortunate in having a man who has given so much time and effort so willingly throughout the year.

My thanks also to the other members of the Council for their support, to all members who have read papers or prepared exhibits as well as the large number of members who have helped throughout the year with supper, Tender Sales, Syllabus, Exhibition and all the other jobs that have required a devotion to the Association which assures us of a successful future.

Another class of member, too often forgotten who I would also like to thank, are those who attend our regular meetings and who by their presence and appreciation contribute greatly to the success of the meetings.

Our financial membership now stands at 226 and our average monthly attendance for the period under review has been 92. Both these figures I feel give some satisfaction but there is no reason at all why our membership should not continue to grow and our attendances increase. Increased attendance has brought with it the problem of accommodation. The holding of two monthly meetings may overcome the problem of cramped meetings but if not you can rest assured that your Council is aware of the problem and will act

accordingly.

Throughout the year a varied programme has been arranged for us by the Syllabus Sub-Committee. These talks and displays have been supplemented by visitors who have added much to our meetings. In May Mr. Ron Osborne, then Superintendent at the Melbourne Branch of the Royal Mint and now at the National Mint, Canberra, addressed the meeting and with the aid of films fully explained the manufacture of coins. At the August meeting the Rt. Honourable A. A. lalvell, M.H.R., exhibited the insignia of The Order of St. Gregory the Great and talked of the circumstances surrounding his award of the Order. In September Mr. Stuart Devlin, the designer of the reverses of the decimal coins spoke to us and exhibited his original plasters. The December meeting was addressed by Mr. R. Parry, an expert on decimals and the problems that the changeover will bring.

All these gentlemen contributed greatly to the knowledge of those of us that were priviledged to hear them and I would again take this opportunity of recording our thanks to them.

My thanks also to the wives of Council members who have graciously allowed us to use their homes for the monthly Council meetings.

Throughout the year the Council have striven to improve the workings of the Association. Little things, many of which have passed unnoticed or which are now taken for granted, have helped. The serving of supper at each meeting has I think greatly helped in promoting a congenial atmosphere.

Early in the year the Council decided that the N.A.V. should possess a library. In years gone by our Association did have quite a reasonable library but as the majority of members at that time owned their own reference books the demands upon the library were very small. This led to the disposal of the books. However with the influx of juniors and beginners the position has altered. A number of books have already been purchased and a number have also been donated. I feel confident that in years to come this library will grow in size and importance.

The financial position of the Association is sound as the Treasurer's report will show.

The decision to strike a Commemorative medallion to honour the Sesqui Centenary of the first distinctive coinage of Australia, or New South Wales as it was 150 years ago, was made early in 1964. Although the striking was limited to silver medallions only, the de-

mand far outreached our expectations. The initial orders from members was in excess of 200 and the Council was faced with the other difficult decision of either disappointing members or striking sufficient extra medallions to meet these orders. The latter course was adopted and although we realise that this could bring critisism upon us we felt that our duty lay in satisfying our own members.

The Council have already discussed a commemorative medallion to be issued for the 50th Anniversary of Gallipoli Landing. Designs are being prepared and the matter will be under discussion again very early this year.

During 1964 the N.A.V. successfully staged the first full scale Exhibition held in this country. To a large extent this was a trial and error show. We felt our way and doubtless made mistakes but the lessons learnt were priceless and will hold good for any future Exhibitions or Conventions. That the Exhibition was a success was due to the tremendous effort of a large group of our members who helped in an enormous number of varied jobs spread over a considerable period.

The N.A.V. were privileged in obtaining The Rt. Honourable Harold Holt, P.C., M.P., The Federal Treasurer, to open the Exhibition. Mrs. Holt also attended the opening of the Exhibition as a guest of the N.A.V.

Press, Radio and Television coverage throughout the Exhibition was very good and contributed greatly to the overall success.

A small sourceir medalet was issued to commemorate the event and several hundreds of these were sold. This type of souvenir is very popular in North America and doubtless there will be many more struck in this country.

The thanks of the Association are due to the Editor of "The Australian Numismatist". He has been an unceasing worker throughout the year. To Mr. Jenkin also our thanks for his efforts in collating the Journal each month.

During the year the Council decided to change to a printed Journal in 1965. This should add to the prestige and standing of "The Australian Numismatist".

In the year past one member only, Mr. H. Robinson of Auckland, New Zealand, submitted papers for publication in our Journal without having first read them at a regular monthly meeting. This is indeed a sad state of affairs. (Continued page 8)

The December meeting was again given over to our Christmas party. I believe that much good can come from members being able to meet and talk together with unlimited time at their disposal. It is my wish that in the coming year we will be able to organize activities that will present these opportunities.

Again to all members my thanks for your support and encouragement in the year past. I feel sure that together we can confidently look forward to an even better year in 1965.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

I have to report the activities of the Council for the year.

A new format to assist the smoother working of the general meetings was instituted - viz. A Social Committee to use the facilities of the kitchen to supply coffee, tea and biscuits at the end of the meeting. A syllabus Committee to arrange the syllabus for the year.

A tender sale Committee to catalogue, appraise and list coins offered for sale.

Printed nomination forms were obtained.

The Council nominated Mr. P. Simon, F.R.N.S. to fill the vacancy in that body. It was decided that a reference library be formed,

books purchased and members were asked to donate books.

Mr. Stewart was appointed "Welcoming Officer" and was to keep the attendance book.

The Editor's request to obtain envelopes to save time in posting the Journal was approved.

At the request of the Australian Numismatic Society to share jointly in the issue of a medallion to commemorate the 150th issue of the Holey Dollar and Dump, your Society agreed to do so. Apparently no action was taken by the A.N.S. Our Association decided to issue the medallion alone.

The Council discussed the possibility of issuing medallions for the 50th Anniversary of the landing at Anzac and the foundation of our Society, but the matter was postponed for further discussion.

To further help in the progress of your Society the Executive decided to hold monthly meetings. Subject to the approval of the Public Library authorities the Council wishes to hold two general meetings a month.

Mr. Calwell visited our meeting to exhibit his Order of St. Gregory the Great. He was presented with a suitable inscribed case containing three medallions, viz. the Papuan, Annand Smith and the Bourke and Wills, donated by Messrs. Kennedy and Jenkin and Philpotts respectively.

In order to facilitate the business of the Association of Victoria, the Library Authorities were requested to:

- (a) extend the use of the theatrette to 11.30p.m.
- (b) provide better lighting for exhibits and
- (c) make provision for housing the library.

An exhibition was held on October 16th, 27th and 18th in the Lower Melbourne Town Hall.

The cost was more than anticipated as we did not obtain a sponsor. To reduce costs the Council issued a commemorative medalet. Members were also asked to donate coins for the purpose of having a "Donation Sale".

The Story behind the Decorations. BAVARIA, by W. E. Curran, E.D., F.R.N.S.

(Continued from December issue)

HOUSE ORDER OF THE KNIGHTS OF ST. GEORGE.
This order was instituted by the Duke Max Emanuel of Bavaria, to commemmorate the "Holy Knights and Martyrs devoted to the

Immaculate Virgin Mary".

When his son the Duke Karl Albrecht came to the throne on the death of Max Emanuel, the new Rules confirmed the Order, and re-established it under the same lengthy title.

The Duke Karl Theodore in 1778 also gave it his ducal patronage, as also did Maximilian Joseph IV, who granted it second ranking in the Bavarian Honors Order of Precedence.

The Order celebrates its feast day on April 24th, and again on December 8th. The Cross of the Order consists of a Maltese Cross in sky blue enamel, with white edges, the centre medallion bearing a picture of the Virgin Mary.

Between the arms of the Cross there are small panels bearing the letters V.I.B.I. (Virgini Immaculate. Bavaria. Immaculate.) There are small gold knobs on the ends of the eight points of the Cross. The reverse of the Medallion bears St. George and the Dragon surrounded by a wreath in green enamel. The Cross was suspended from a golden lions head holding an inverted half moon in its mouth, to which was attached a "fleur de lis" in blue enamel.

The ribband of the Order is shaded light blue to dark blue with white border stripes.

The Star of the Order consists of two Maltese crosses, one within the other, edged gold, the angles containing a loszenge in the Bavarian colors, green and white. The centre medallion consisting of the red St. Georges Cross with white background. It was worn on the left breast.

The neck chain consisted of a series of three links composed as follows, (i) Two lions supporting a column surmounted by an Orb, (ii) two lozenges of the Bavarian arms and (iii) an oblong plaque, crowns on each end, laurel leaves above and below. The Motto "In Fide Justicia et Fortutidine" is read along the plaques, each bearing a few letters of the whole motto. Capes and hats complete the attire of the members of the Order.

On February 25th, 1827, the Order received a new Constitution, and from that date the King assumed the rank of Grandmaster, and the Crown Prince held the next place in seniority. The Order had 6 Grand Commanders, and 12 Commanders and Knights. Earlier there had been an ecclaesiastical class, consisting of a Bishop, 4 Deacons and a Chaplain of the Order. But under a Statute dated April 17th, 1871, a branch open to persons engaged in "Works of Compassion"

was formed. This consisted of 6 Chief Grand Commanders, and 12 Chief Commanders of Honor and Knights.

This Branch of the Order was Roman Catholic, and members had to be at least 21 years of age, and were required to undergo a test before being admitted to membership.

Of those examined only 32 were chosen and these bore the title of "Gabel" or "Tendrils". There were also 24 German or foreign ladies of rank admitted under the title of "Knights of the Foreign Tongue". The term "tongue" is synonomous with the french "langue" meaning "branch" or the German "Zunge".

ST. GEORGES MEDAL.

This Decoration was instituted by the Prince Regent Leopold of Bavaria, who died at Munich on December 15th, 1889. The Decoration dates from December 8th, 1889 and was issued to commemmorate the Feast of the House Order of St. George.

The Medal can only be worn with the insignia of the Knightly ORDER of St. GEORGE, and the Medal, in gold, bears on the obverse a shield with the inscription "LUITPOLD, PRINZREGENT VON BAYERN", surrounding the picture of St. George on horseback. The medal is worn suspended from a ribband of sky blue with red and white edge stripes.

OUT OF THE PAST

Report in the Ballarat Courier of 25th January, 1950, states: A Reminder of the days of George I was a coin dated 1701 found in Jermyns Tea Rooms in the Block Arcade yesterday. During the morning Miss Eileen O'Neill of Bendigo picked up the coin and was surprised to find its ancient date and inscription.

The Herald Auckland N.Z. of June 1st 1949 reports that a Jew walked into a building in Vienna and formerly used by the German Air Force and asked permission to remove his father's property left there in 1934 during the NAZI reign of terror. Police watched as the young man tore away wooden pannelling below a window frame disclosing a tin containing gold coins worth £6,000.
